CITY OF BOSTON IN CITY COUNCIL

ORDER FOR A HEARING REGARDING SPECULATION IN THE BOSTON HOUSING MARKET

WHEREAS: The City of Boston has adopted the Housing 2030 goal of building 53,000 new

housing units by 2030; and

WHEREAS: Even as the City has been on track to meet these housing production goals, families

are facing fewer and fewer affordable housing options, forcing many to leave Boston,

including many families who have called the City home for generations; and

WHEREAS: Flipping of residential properties into luxury condominiums or apartments continues

to increase prices and decrease affordable housing opportunities; and

WHEREAS: According to the Association of Foreign Investors in Real Estate (AFIRE), Boston

ranks third in the nation for cities with foreign investment in its real estate market;

and

WHEREAS: Short term rentals are becoming a business model for too many property owners to

make a maximum profit by functioning like informal hotels, with short term rental

occupying all of the housing units year round decimating housing stock in

neighborhoods and creating a nuisance and safety hazard; and

WHEREAS: Traditional pathways to home ownership are increasingly unobtainable by working

and middle class families; and

WHEREAS: Displacement of long-term residents, seniors, and working families due to increasing

rents and fewer affordable pathways to home ownership, continues to destabilize our

schools, local economies, and communities; and

WHEREAS: The federal government has demonstrated decreasing investment in building or

subsidizing vouchers for affordable housing; and

WHEREAS: Cities have had to lead on slowing down speculation through regulations that protect

housing stock for working families, seniors and long-term residents, and that can also

generate revenue for city services, such as taxes on flipping, taxes on foreign

speculation, condominium conversion caps, and luxury transfer fees; and limiting the

short term rental marker to one unit in owner occupied buildings NOW

THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED,

That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss ways to generate revenue and increase home ownership opportunities by slowing down the speculation within Boston's housing market, and that the Department of Neighborhood Development and any other interested parties shall be invited to attend.
