ORDER FOR A HEARING REGARDING EQUITABLE ACCESS TO PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION WITH A CASHLESS FARE COLLECTION SYSTEM

WHEREAS: Residents of every socioeconomic background rely on public transportation to live, work, and play in and around Greater Boston; and

WHEREAS: The Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA) is planning policy changes aimed at increasing efficiency and streamlining riders' interactions with the public

transit system; and

WHEREAS: These changes include implementing a cashless fare collection system that would eliminate cash payments to board buses, trolleys, and trains, and instead require customers to pay fares by tapping a CharlieCard, credit card, or smartphone on an electronic reader; and

WHEREAS: Advocates have raised concerns about the impact of this specific policy change for people with low incomes, people who are underbanked without access to credit cards or smartphones, and our elderly population; and

WHEREAS: The MBTA has approved a \$723 million contract to modernize the fare collection system that would include creating a network of retailers that sell and reload the cards to support a cashless system; and

WHEREAS: The Boston City Council has an interest in understanding the design process for updating and streamlining riders' interactions with the public transit system, and how proposed changes account for socioeconomic barriers to continue creating and building a transit system that is affordable, accessible, and reliable for all riders;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT

ORDERED, That the appropriate committee of the Boston City Council hold a hearing to discuss the MBTA's proposed cashless fare system, focusing on ways to support the transit system in accounting for the experience of all riders, and that the MBTA and any other interested parties shall be invited to attend.
