THEY'RE ALSO CONTRIBUTING DOC FIBER.

WHILE THIS LEASE HAS 173 SITES AND VERIZON IS ALSO GOING TO DO QUITE A NUMBER OF SITES.

THEY'LL BE PROVIDING US WITH DOC FIBER THE SAME WAY THAT COMCAST DOES.

THE EXPANSION OF THE CITY NETWORK AND THE FULL COVERAGE OF THE CITY BUILDINGS WILL BE DONE. A LOT IS GETTING DONE THE NEXT TWO YEARS.

>> AND WITH RESPECT TO THE --WE'RE SEEING IT A LOT, PARTICULARLY IN THE VIDEO SURVEILLANCE CAMERAS AROUND THE DEVELOPMENT AND LITIGATION, A LOT OF FOLKS ARE PUTTING IN SURVEILLANCE CAMERAS.

THERE'S A DIRECT TIE-IN TO THE BOSTON POLICE DEPARTMENT.

WHEN A NEW DEVELOPMENT COMES IN, SHOULD WE ENCOURAGE -- IS IT SOMETHING THAT WE CAN DO AT THE COUNCIL LEVEL WHEN WE'RE FACED WITH DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS IN OUR RESPECTIVE COMMUNITIES -- I REPRESENT THE WHOLE CITY.

LIKE CHAIRMAN CIOMMO OR COUNCILLOR FLYNN IN CHINATOWN, BRIGHTON, A BIG PROJECT GOING ON, WOULD IT BEHOOVE THEM TO SAY WHAT IS YOUR DOC FIBER PLAN AND DOES IT HELP US AT ALL OR AM I

TALKING APPLES AND ORANGES?
>> IT HELPS THE RESIDENTS OF THE NEW DEVELOPMENTS.

IN THE DISTRICT OF COUNCILLOR FLYNN IN YOUR HOMETOWN IN SOUTH BOSTON, AS THE NEW DEVELOPMENT HAPPENED ON THE LOWER END, THIS ISSUE CAME UP A LOT OVER THE LAST FOUR YEARS.

PARTICULARLY WITH THE SMALLER --I CALL IT SMALLER.

I DON'T KNOW WHAT DESCRIPTION THEY HAVE.

20 UNITS OR LESS. DEVELOPERS WOULD QUICKLY GET IN TO THE BUILDING, THEY WOULDN'T THINK THAT GEE, I SHOULD HAVE VERIZON COME IN AND COMCAST COME IN SO PEOPLE HAVE CHOICE. FOLKS WOULD GET INSIDE AND WHATEVER, THEY PHONE WOULDN'T WORK OR THEY WANTED CHOICE. THEY WOULD SAY I DON'T WANT TO GO WITH THIS COMPANY OR THESE

IT'S VERY IMPORTANT TO OUR IT IS SUB SEN -- CITIZENS.

WE HAVE DEVELOPED A OUESTIONNAIRE.

GUYS.

I BELIEVE IT'S ADOPTED -- IT'S VOLUNTARY BUT ADOPTED TO ARTICLE 80.

A QUESTIONNAIRE FOR DEVELOPERS TO FILL OUT.

IT DOESN'T TELL THEM WHAT THEY HAVE TO DO BUT IT ASKS THE RIGHT OUESTIONS.

DO THIS ON THE FRONT END AND IT WORKS TO THE FUTURE.

>> THANKS VERY MUCH.

>> A COUPLE QUICK WRAP-UP OUESTIONS.

>> IT'S LIKE A RENTAL AGREEMENT. THE MATH WOULD BE ABOUT 300,000 PER YEAR FOR 30 YEARS OR IS IT FOR 20 AND WE HAVE TO RENEW SEPARATE AGREEMENTS FOR THE FIVE AND FIVE?

IS IT FOR 20 OR 30 YEARS, I GUESS --

>> THE CONTRACT IS FOR 20 YEARS WITH TWO OPTIONS.

>> TWO OPTIONS.

AT THAT TIME YOU'LL NEGOTIATE WHATEVER THE MARKET BEARS OR SOMETHING.

>> EXACTLY.

>> WHAT IS THE INFRASTRUCTURE? YOU SAID TEN YEARS AGO WITH COMCAST.

THE FIBER WE'RE USING, IS IT MORE -- IS IT THAT OLD, TEN YEARS AND DOES IT MATTER LIKE -- >> FIBER SEEMS TO HAVE AN INCREDIBLY LONG LIFE. BRETT HAYNES IS OVER THERE. HE WILL REMEMBER THIS. I THINK BACK IN THE LATE 80s OR EARLY 90s, WE INSTALLED THROUGH ONE OF THESE TYPE OF PARTNERSHIPS WHAT WE CALL THE MXP FIBER.

IT'S ACTIVE.

RUNS FROM CITY HALL DOWN TO FENWAY FIRE ALARM. HITS THE LIBRARY AND A FEW BUILDINGS ALONG THE WAY. FIBER LAST AS LONG TIME AS LONG AS ITS WELL-PLACED.

>> IT'S NOT LIKE LEVEL Y OR CABLE ABOVE GROUND WITH THE ELEMENTS.

THIS IS FROM MY EDUCATION, YEARS AGO I REMEMBER WE TRIED TO GET THE TELECOM COMPANIES TO PAY US LIKE RENT FOR THE AIRSPACE. THIS BEING UNDERGROUND, DO WE GET SOME RECIPROCAL CONSIDERATION BECAUSE IT'S PUBLIC -- THEY'RE USING PUBLIC LAND SO TO SPEAK.

IF YOU FOLLOW WHAT I'M SAYING. >> IN THE CITY, FOR THE LAST 30 YEARS, THEY'VE HAD A SHADOW CONDUIT POLICY.

IF YOU'RE MAKING A DIG, YOU'RE ENCOURAGED TO PUT IN EXTRA EMPTY CONDUIT FOR FUTURE USE, BY THE CITY OR ANOTHER PROVIDER.

THE SETTLEMENT ALIGNS WITH THE HEALTH COMMISSIONS REACHED WITH THE UNIONIZED EMPLOYEES AND INCLUDES PLANS TO RULE OUT A POST ACCIDENT DRUG TESTING POLICY.

IT'S A CRITERIA AS TO WHETHER YOU QUALIFY FOR CERTAIN TYPES OF BENEFITS PURSUANT TO THE CONTRACT.

WHEN WE HAVE PEOPLE LIKE THAT THAT GET EMPLOYED, WE COMPLY WITH THEIR OBLIGATIONS.

WITH THEIR OBLIGATIONS.

I'M NOT SURE WE HAVE A LIST.

>> AND FOR JUSTIN, ONE THING
THAT WOULD BE IMPORTANT FOR MY
AS A CITY COUNCILLOR, SOMEONE
THAT HAS BEEN 25 YEARS IN THE
MILITARY, DURING THESE CONTRACT
NEGOTIATIONS, CAN WE ALSO
REMEMBER AND KEEP IN MIND THAT
SOME OF THESE EMPLOYEES MIGHT BE
IN THE MILITARY RESERVES, THE
NATIONAL GUARD AND CAN WE FACTOR

THAT IN MAKING SURE THAT THEY'RE TREATED FAIRLY, TREATED WITH RESPECT AND AT LEAST ASK THE QUESTION WHEN YOU GUYS ARE NEGOTIATING, IS THERE ANYTHING THAT WE CAN DO TO HELP OUR RESERVISTS, ANYTHING WE CAN DO TO HELP OUR NATIONAL GUARD AND ANYTHING WE CAN DO TO HELP OUR MILITARY FAMILIES IS ALSO IMPORTANT.

SO I JUST WANT TO SEE IF WE CAN PUT THAT IN THE BACK OF OUR MINDS AS WE GO FORWARD, THAT THAT'S AN IMPORTANT ISSUE TO A LOT OF FAMILIES.

WE MIGHT NOT HEAR ABOUT IT, BUT IT'S AN IMPORTANT ISSUE.

>> YEAH.

- I'LL TAKE THAT BACK TO THE TEAM.
- >> THANK YOU.
- >> THANKS, COUNCILLOR FLYNN.
- I JUST WANT TO DIVE BACK INTO THE SICK LEAVE.
- SO DO YOU HAVE -- WHAT IS THE POLICY?

CAN YOU DESCRIBE THE SICK LEAVE POLICY THAT SCIE OR THE NONUNION EMPLOYEES, IS IT THAN OTHER DEPARTMENTS?

>> ARE YOU TALKING ABOUT THE SICK LEAVE REDEMPTION -- >> YEAH.

DO YOU HAVE TO BUY IT EVERY YEAR?

A LOT OF THE COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENTS NOW HAVE PUT THE CAP THAT YOU DESCRIBED EARLIER.

SO YOU CAN ONLY BUY UP TO SO MUCH AT THE END WHEN YOU RETIRE. DO YOU NOT HAVE THAT PROGRAM OR THAT POLICY AT ALL WITH THESE EMPLOYEES?

BUT THERE IS SOME VARIATIONS ON COLLECTIVE BARGAINING ON THAT.
THE NONUNION EMPLOYEES, THEY DON'T HAVE THAT BENEFIT AND NEITHER DO THE COUNCILLORS AND THE LOCAL 88 UNIT.

>> AGAIN, JUST FOR CLARIFICATION.

WE SHOULD TRY TO KEEP -- HAVE CONSISTENT BENEFITS AND WAGES FOR AS MANY OF OUR EMPLOYEES. IS THERE -- SO LET'S SAY THEY EARN 12 SICK DAYS A YEAR OR WHATEVER IT IS PRESCRIBED BY CITY POLICY, I WOULD IMAGINE. DO THEY -- I KNOW SOME DEPARTMENTS MIGHT SAY IF YOU DON'T CALL IN SICK IN A YEAR, YOU GET LIKE A WEEK, SICK LEAVE BACK.

IS THAT PART OF THE POLICY OR DO YOU USE IT OR LOSE IT?
I'M CURIOUS.

WE SHOULD MAKE IT AS STANDARD AS POSSIBLE ACROSS OUR DEPARTMENTS. >> SO THERE'S VARIATION THERE TOO?

WE REFER TO THAT AS AN ANNUAL BUY-BACK PROGRAM.

THE NONUNION EMPLOYEES DON'T HAVE THAT BENEFIT AND NEITHER DO THE LOCAL 88 UNIT.

>> INTERESTING.

JUSTIN, JUST FOR -- WE WORK TOGETHER VERY CLOSELY.

JERRY IS LIKE -- ARE THERE MANY VARIATIONS OF THAT PARTICULAR POLICY?

>> I'D SAY WE'RE STRIVING TO PUT THAT ON THE TABLE WHEN WE'RE IN DISCUSSIONS.

IT REALLY DEPENDS ON WHAT THE SPECIFIC REQUESTS ARE.

>> YOU GOT DELTA HANDS.

I'M NOT PUTTING IT ON YOU.

>> NO, RIGHT.

>> AS A MATTER OF PRACTICE, WE SHOULD TO BE CONSISTENT WITH ALL EMPLOYEES AS A MATTER OF FAIRNESS.

EACH INDIVIDUAL BARGAINING UNIT NEGOTIATES AND GETS DIFFERENT BENEFITS AND MAYBE SOME COSTS. ANYWAY, I THANK YOU FOR YOUR TESTIMONY.
