>> THANK YOU.

I AM ADVISED TODAY AND FULL SUPPORT OF MY UNION BROTHERS OF THE UNITED AUTO WORKERS. I'M A MEMBER OF THAT UNION THROUGH MY WORK AT LEGAL SERVICES.

PART OF THE ORGANIZING EFFORT IS TO MAKE AND VALUED, ESPECIALLY WORKERS WHO ARE STUDENTS ALSO AT OUR COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES.

THE FACT OF THE MATTER IS THERE ARE STUDENTS WHO WORK TIRELESSLY TEACHING COURSES, WORKING ON PATENTS, WORKING EXTREMELY HARD, AND WHAT THEY ARE FACING ARE A LOT OF DISCRIMINATORY ISSUES, A LOT OF THE PAY EQUITY ISSUES AND A LOT OF THE ISSUES THAT FACE

WORKERS EVERY SINGLE DAY, BUT BECAUSE THEY'RE PART OF AN INSTITUTION AND SOME OF THEIR WORK INVOLVES RESEARCH. THEY'RE BEING DENIED THE THAT'S OF A WORKER. AND IT'S NOT JUST THE STATUS OF A WORKER THEY'RE BEING DENIED.

WE HAVE GRADUATE STUDENTS, MANY BECOMING PARENTS, MARRIED, WORKING EXTREMELY HARD, AND WONDERING IF SHE CAN KEEP HER JOB AS A RESEARCHER OR LAB TECH BUT ALSO BECAUSE SHE'S PREGNANT SHE'S WORRIED ABOUT TELLING HER PROFESSOR AND HER RESEARCH MAY BE THE REASON SHE NO LONGER GETS TO CONTINUE HER RESEARCH. SHE HAS NO PROTECTION OR REASONABLE ACCOMMODATIONS. THERE ARE PEOPLE TEACHING REGULARLY AS GRAD STUDENTS WHO COME IN AND TEACH FOR THE PROFESSORS. MANY ARE WAITING WEEKS IF NOT

THE SEMESTER FOR THE PAYCHECK BECAUSE THE PROFESSOR SIMPLY FORGETS TO SIGN IT. THERE'S NO PRIORITIZATION FOR

THEM. BUT THEY'RE RENTS ARE DUE ON THE

FIRST AND THEY HAVE BILLS TO PAY.

THEY'RE DEALING WITH THE PRESSURES AND BURDENS OF BEING THE WORKER WITHOUT THE PROTECTIONS OR BENEFITS. THE STUDENTS ARE WORKING ON PATENTS FOR BILLIONS OF DOLLARS FOR THESE INSTITUTIONS TO MAKE MONEY OFF OF AND STILL CAN'T GET PAID MINIMUM-WAGE SOMETIMES. I ASK WE STAND IN SOLIDARITY WITH THOSE WORKERS, AND THAT'S WHAT THEY ARE. THEY ARE HARD WORKERS WHO ALSO

HAPPEN TO BE PART OF RESEARCH INSTITUTION.

THE SAME INSTITUTIONS RECOGNIZE OTHER WORKERS BE IT IN THE SECURITY OR CAFETERIAS. WHEN THEY DIDN'T. WE MADE SURE THAT THOSE WORKING IN THE CAFES WERE OFFERED WORKER STATUS AND PROTECTIONS. WE HAVE A BAD ACTOR TODAY, UNFORTUNATELY, BOSTON COLLEGE. THEY HAVE NOT ONLY NOT RECOGNIZED THE RECENT GRADUATE STUDENT UNION AS THE STUDENTS RECOGNIZED AND ORGANIZED THE UNION AND VOTED FOR THAT BUT REFUSED TO NEGOTIATE WITH THEM. WHEN THE STUDENTS ORGANIZED, THEY FACED ACADEMIC PROBATION AND WERE PUNISHED FOR ORGANIZING AS A STUDENT UNION. THAT IS AGAINST NOT ONLY THE CHARACTER OF THE INSTITUTION BUT THE CATHOLIC FAITH THEY'RE PROMOTING AS A JESUIT INSTITUTION. SO WE'RE ASKING YOU TO STAND

THAT ORDINANCE NOT ONLY IS TALKING ABOUT THE REQUIREMENTS, **BUT CREATING REPORTING** REQUIREMENTS OF A QUARTERLY REPORT TO DETAIL WHAT PERCENTAGE OF CITY DOLLARS ARE GOING TO EACH OF THE CATEGORIES. WE PASSED THAT IN DECEMBER OF 2017 AND SINCE THEN HAVE ONLY GOTTEN ONE QUARTERLY REPORT FROM NOVEMBER 2018. IT WAS INCREDIBLY EYE OPENING AND INFORMATIVE. WE LEARNED THROUGH THAT REPORT THAT OF ALL THE CITY SPENDS, EVERYTHING FROM THE PAPER THAT WE BUY IN MUNICIPAL BUILDINGS TO CONTRACTS TO GET PARKS' GRASS CUT AND CLEANED UP, OF ALL THOSE DOLLARS, CURRENTLY .27% GOES TO BUSINESSES OWNED BY PEOPLE OF COLOR, .47% GOES TO CERTIFIED WOMEN-OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISES, AND 1.3% GOES TO THE LOCAL BUSINESSES. I AM AT THE POINT NOW WHERE, FOR SEVERAL YEARS, WE'VE HAD CONVERSATIONS ABOUT RESIDENT PARKING IN BOSTON, HAD A PUBLIC HEARING AND MORE MEETINGS AND MORE CONVERSATIONS WITH **RESIDENTS FROM VARIOUS** NEIGHBORHOODS, AND THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT IS THE PARKING SYSTEM ISN'T WORKING FOR A LOT OF REPRESENTATIVES. IT IS INCREDIBLY TOUGH TO HAVE A DISCUSSION WITH RESIDENTS TO CHARGE FOR SOMETHING THAT PEOPLE ARE CURRENTLY GETTING FOR FREE, BUT THE CHARGE THAT WE ARE ALREADY PAYING IS THAT PEOPLE CIRCLING, LOOKING FOR A SPOT WHEN THEY GET HOME FROM WORK. IN SOME NEIGHBORHOODS AN HOUR OR MORE, IF YOU GET HOME A MINUTE AFTER 4:45 OR 5:00 P.M., THAT IS LEADING TO LOOT MORE TRAFFIC OR CONGESTION, THAT IS LEADING TO POLLUTION AND OUR AIR QUALITY, CREATING MORE ASTHMA IN OUR YOUTH AND PEOPLE WHO LIVE IN THESE CONGESTED AREAS. INTERESTINGLY, JUST TODAY OR YESTERDAY, MASS U CAME OUT WITH

A POLL, PEOPLE'S OPINIONS WHEN

IT COMES TO TRAFFIC AND CONGESTION.

HOW ARE RESIDENTS BEING AFFECTED BY THE EXPERIENCE OF LIVING IN A

CONGESTED CITY.

RESIDENTS WHO HAVE NEWTS

COMMUTES OF 45 MINUTES OR MORE

ARE CHANGING JOBS, 30% OF THEM

CONSIDERED LEAVING THE AREA

ALTOGETHER.

BAD.

TWO-THIRDS OF PEOPLE SURVEYED SAY THEY HAVE TO SCHEDULE THEIR LIVES AROUND WHAT WOULD BE IDEAL FOR THEM, THEY HAVE TO CHOOSE A DIFFERENT SCHEDULE THAN WHAT WOULD BE IDEAL TO AVOID THE WORST PARTS OF TRAFFIC, IT IS SO

NEARLY TWO-THIRDS REPORT THAT THEY ARE STRAPPED, ANGRY, FRUSTRATED, AND I THINK WE'VE ALL EXPERIENCED THAT TRYING TO GET AROUND THE CITY, TOO. SO WHAT'S THE CONNECTION BETWEEN RESIDENT PARKING AND TRAFFIC? SOME STUDIES HAVE SUGGESTED THAT 30% OF CARS CIRCLING A CONGESTED DOWNTOWN AREA ARE LOOKING FOR PARKING.

SO WHEN WE MAKE IT DIFFICULT FOR PEOPLE, WHEN WE KEEP IT LOW COST FOR A CAR, THERE'S NO THINKING WHAT YOU WILL DO FOR THE CAR, OF COURSE YOU WILL GET THE RESIDENT PARKING EVEN IF IT MEANS YOU HAVE TO CIRCLE THE BLOCK A COUPLE OF TIMES.

CITY WHO HAVE MOVED TO HAVING A FREE SYSTEM SO EVEN HAVING A VERY MODEST CHARGE HAVE SEEN PEOPLE THINK ABOUT THEIR CAR USAGE AND THEIR PARKING DECISIONS DIFFERENTLY.
AGAIN, \$25 A YEAR IS A LOT TO ASK FOR RESIDENTS LIVING IN AN INCREASINGLY EXPENSIVE CITY.
THE ORDINANCE DOES MAKE EFFORTS TO TRY TO MITIGATE SOME OF THAT FOR OUR MOST VULNERABLE

IT INCLUDES EXTENSIONS FOR SENIORS AND LOW-INCOME RERPTS, EXEMPTIONS FOR HOME HEALTH CARE AIDES AND BOSTON PUBLIC SCHOOL

RESIDENTS.

STAFF THAT WOULD BE VISITTEN STUDENTS OR PATIENTS, BUT WHATEVER THE SHAPE, WHETHER \$25 FOR THE FIRST CAR, 50 FOR THE SECOND, 75 FOR THE THIRD, OR NO CHARGE FOR THE FIRST, 25 FOR THE SECOND. OR -- WE NEED TO HAVE THE CONVERSATION NOT JUST ABOUT COMMERCIAL PARKING AS THE ADMINISTRATION HAS BEEN DOING REALLY WELL AND WITH GREAT SUCCESS, WE HAVE TO HAVE A CONVERSATION ABOUT OUR NEIGHBORHOODS, TOO, BECAUSE QUALITY OF HYPHSIMILAR PACTED, PEOPLE ARE FEELING IT, AND WE DON'T HAVE TO BE TRAPPED IN THIS SITUATION WHERE SOME NEIGHBORHOODS JUST HAVE TO DEAL WITH IT AND YOU'RE JUST GOING TO HAVE TO CIRCLE AND CAUSE TRAFFIC AND POLLUTION. THESE ARE POLICY DECISIONS THAT PEOPLE ARE MAKING. AND WE NEED TO HAVE THAT CONVERSATION. WE NEED TO STEP UP BECAUSE THE TRAFFIC GETTING WORSE DAY BY DAY BY DAY, AND IT'S GOING TO BE A COMBINATION OF THINGS LIKE THIS ALONG WITH CONGESTION PRICING TO TRY TO EASE TRAFFIC COMING IN FROM OUTSIDE THE CITY, A LOT OF CONVERSATIONS ABOUT THE GAS TAX. ALONG WITH CONVERSATIONS ABOUT TRANSPORTATION CLIMATE INITIATIVE. IT HAS TO BE ON THE TABLE TALKING ABOUT UBER AND LYFT AS WELL AND THE CONTRIBUTION THEY'RE MAKING TO TRAFFIC AND NOT PITCHING IN WHEN IT COMES TO PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION, IT ALL HAS TO BE ON THE TABLE, AND UNLESS THE CITY OF BOSTON IS DOING OUR PART BY TAKE EFFING RISTEP WE CAN, WE ARE NOT TRULY SERVING OUR REPRESENTATIVES AS WELL. I WELCOME YOUR FEEDBACK. I KNOW IT'S DIFFICULT TO TALK ABOUT THINGS LIKE THIS, BUT THIS IS OPEN FOR DEBATE AND DISCUSSION.

I FELT LIKE, AFTER THREE OR FOUR

YEARS NOW OF TALKING WITH THE ADMINISTRATION AND TALKING WITH COLLEAGUES, IT IS TIME TO PUT AN OFFICIAL PROPOSAL ON THE TABLE AND WE CAN HAVE A DEBATE OR DISCUSSION FROM THERE, THANK YOU.

- >> THANK YOU, COUNCILLOR WU. COUNCILLOR GARRISON, YOU HAVE THE FLOOR.

I WAS AT A COMMUNITY MEETING IN EAST BOSTON LAST WEEK AND I

HEARD FROM CONCERNED RESIDENTS

WHO HAVE PARKING PERMITS BUT STILL CANNOT PARK ON THEIR

STREET BECAUSE OTHER DRIVERS

COME IN FROM OUT OF CITY AND

PARK IN THE PARKING SPACES.

RESIDENT PARKING ONLY SPOTS AND

THEY NEVER GET TICKETED OR TOWED.

PEOPLE DEFINITELY HAVE TO HAVE INCENTIVES NOT TO PARK THERE.

HOW ABOUT WE FIRST PARTNER WITH

THE BOSTON POLICE DEPARTMENT TO

FIX THE PROBLEM IN THE CITY

BEFORE CHARGING OUR RESIDENTS

THESE FEES, WHEN THEY CANNOT

FIND A RESIDENT SPOT TO PARK

EVEN WITH A FREE PERMIT. FINALLY, AS IT REGARDS

AND, AGAIN, I THINK YOU'VE PUT

FORWARD A SMART PROPOSAL THAT

WILL AT LEAST GET THE BALL

ROLLING AND ALLOW US TO HAVE

THIS IMPORTANT CONVERSATION.

WE CAN'T SHY AWAY FROM HAVING A

CONVERSATION BECAUSE IT MAY BE UNPOPULAR BECAUSE PEOPLE HAVE

BEEN GETTING IT FOR FREE. RENEED THE REVENUE, WE KICKED OFF THE BUDGET SEASON THIS WEEK. WE CERTAINLY KNOW THE RECEIPTS THAT COME INTO THE CITY IS A SMALL PIECE OF THAT PIE. THIS WOULD CERTAINLY INCREASE THAT, BUT IF WE ARE GOING TO DO THIS, I CERTAINLY SUPPORT A GRADUATED SYSTEM. IT MAY BE THAT WE EXEMPT THE FIRST VEHICLE, IT MAY BE THAT WE OFFER SOMETHING SMALL LIKE \$25 -- MIND YOU, THIS IS OVER THE COURSE OF A YEAR, SO IT COSTS WAY MORE TO FILL YOUR TANK AND DO EVERYTHING ELSE WITH YOUR CAMP. I DON'T THINK IT'S REASONABLE TO HAVE THIS CONVERSATION, IN FACT, I THINK IT'S VERY IMPORTANT TO HAVE THIS CONVERSATION, NOT JUST FROM A REVENUE STANDPOINT BUT AS ONE TO REALLY HELP US THINK ABOUT HOW TO KEEP TRAFFIC MOVING, HOW TO FREE UP SOME PARKING IN OUR CITY, WHICH IS BECOMING OVERRUN BY VEHICLES IN OUR CITY. SO WE HAVE TO LOOK AT ALL OF THE TOOLS, YET AGAIN, TO ENSURE THAT WE ARE -- THAT WE ARE REALLY PUTTING FORTH SOMETHING THAT WILL HELP IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF LIFE FOR THE RESIDENTS IN THIS GREAT CITY. SPOKE TO THIS MORNING WAS CONCERNED ABOUT THAT, AND I FOLLOWED UP TO LET HER KNOW THERE'S AN EXEMPTION FOR LOW INCOME. I LOOK FORWARD TO THE CONVERSATION AND I THANK YOU AGAIN FOR PUT IT ON THE TABLE. THAT'S IT. >> COUNCILLOR JANEY, WOULD YOU LIKE TO ADD YOUR NAME? >> OH, YES, AND PLEASE ADD MY NAME. >> THANK YOU, COUNCILLOR JANEY. MADAM CLERK, IF YOU COULD ADD COUNCILLOR JANEY. WE HAVE TO CHANGE.

THE QUESTION IS HOW WE'RE GOING TO CHANGE TOGETHER SO THAT WE DO

NOT HURT THOSE WHO ARE

PARTICULARLY CONCERNED ABOUT

THEIR POCKETBOOKS AND THAT WE

DON'T BURDEN PEOPLE WHO

LITERALLY LIVE HERE AND ARE JUST

TRYING TO COME HOME.

THERE ARE PEOPLE I THINK THIS

ORDINANCE INVITES TO THE TABLE.

I WOULD INVITE MORE PEOPLE TO

THIS CONVERSATION WITH SOME

SUGGESTIONS.

ONE, I WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT WE ARE NOT -- BEFORE WE'RE TALKING

ABOUT BOSTON RESIDENTS PAYING FOR PARKING, BUT WE REALLY TALK BACK TO THE COMMUNITIES AND HAVE THE COMMUNITIES COME UP WITH CORRIDORS HAVE THERE COULD BE METERED PARKING FOR FOLKS WHO DON'T LIVE IN BOSTON NECESSARILY OR COMING, IN POSSIBLY PARK BIG OUR CHIEF STATION, AND BECAUSE THEY HAVE TWO HOURS OF FREE PARKING GETTING ON THE T AND COMING BACK TO THAT T STATION THAT'S ON THE BORDER OF BOSTON AND THEN GOING ON ABOUT THEIR BUSINESS.

I WANT TO MAKE SURE FOLKS WHO ARE INVITED TO THE TABLE ARE EMPLOYERS.

IT'S SOMETHING WE SHOULD HAVE COMPANIES DOING AND I HOPE THE CITY OF BOSTON CONSIDERS DOING THAT AS WELL, NOT JUST FROM DIRECT PAY BUT MAKING SURE THEY'RE INVENTIVIZING EMPLOYEES. I THINK WHAT'S KEY AND WHAT I DO REALLY FEEL EXCITED ABOUT IS HAVING THE PARKING SENSE INCORPORATED INTO THAT CONVERSATION BECAUSE IT'S REALLY HARD TO COME UP WITH A POLICY ABOUT A FINITE AMOUNT OF PARKING SPACES IF WE ACTUALLY DON'T KNOW WHAT THAT NUMBER IS AND WHERE THEY ARE.

I THINK, ALSO, WHAT'S REALLY GREAT ABOUT THIS IS THE VISITOR PARKING PASS, WHICH IS SOMETHING I THINK IN GENERAL WE NEED TO HAVE A SERIOUS CONVERSATION ABOUT.

I ALSO WANTED TO MAKE SURE THAT

PART OF THIS PARKING REFORM
CONVERSATION INVOLVES WHERE WE
WOULD HAVE PICKUP, DROP OFF
SITES FOR UBER AND LYFT.
IT'S FRUSTRATING SEEING THEM
CIRCLE AROUND THE NEIGHBORHOODS
WAITING FOR THEIR NEXT CALL,
WHERE IN SOME CASES WE CAN SAY
UBER AND LYFT CAN PICK UP OVER
HERE AND PEOPLE CAN WALK TO
THEM.

WHAT IT COMES DOWN TO IS MAKING SURE THAT, WHEN WE HAVE THESE CONVERSATIONS, THE EXEMPTIONS ARE FOR OUR MOST VULNERABLE AND INCLUDE ALL OF THE INDIVIDUALS. ONE POPULATION IN PARTICULAR THAT I WOULD LOVE TO SEE ADDED TO THIS ARE THOSE IN OUR HOMELESS SHELTERS.
WE HAD A CASE WITH A WOMEN ASSIGNED THROUGH THE STATE TO

ASSIGNED THROUGH THE STATE TO CROSSROADS IN EAST BOSTON.
THE ONLY THING SHE HAD LEFT WAS HER CAR.

THAT WAS THE ONLY WAY SHE COULD MAKE ENOUGH MONEY TO HOPEFULLY GET OUT TO HAVE THE SHELTER AND THE CITY OF BOSTON PUT A BOOT ON IT BECAUSE SHE DIDN'T HAVE A RESIDENT STICKER AND COULDN'T AFFORD THE TICKET TO PAY THERE. SO I WANTED TO MAKE SURE THAT WHEN WE'RE TALKING PARKING REFORM, AND THAT'S WHAT I HOPE THIS CONVERSATION BECOMES, YES, WE NEED TO TALK ABOUT FEES, BUT WE NEED TO CHANGE HOW THINGS WORK.

WE HAVE A PARKING TASK FORCE KICKED OFF IN EAST BOSTON WHERE WE'RE PLANNING WHERE ANGLED PARKING WOULD GO, WHERE NEW METERS WOULD GO, THAT'S, I THINK, THE CONVERSATION, AND I WANT TO BE CLEAR ABOUT THE VISION AS WELL, IT'S A GOAL TO GENERATE REVENUE OR A GOAL TO REDUCE THE AMOUNT OF CARS ON THE STREET.

I DON'T KNOW THAT \$25 IS GOING TO DO THAT.

I DON'T KNOW THAT \$50 IS GOING TO DO THAT.

BUT WITHOUT THAT KIND OF CLEAR VISION AND GOAL, I THINK THAT THIS CONVERSATION WILL BE HARDERRED TO HAVE.

I WANT TO THANK A COMMISSIONER WHO CAME OUT IN THE MIDDLE OF THE WEEK TO MEET WITH THE TASK FORCE IN EAST BOSTON.

I'M GOING TO DEEPLY MISS HER AND HER SERVICE AND LEADERSHIP WHEN IT COMES TO PARKING IN BTD.

SHE HAS BEEN INCREDIBLE NOT ONLY TO OUR COMMUNITY IN EAST BOSTON BUT ALL OF BOSTON AND WILL BE

SERVING US.

DALLAS IS GETTING A GREAT **BOSTONIAN AND A GREAT** COMMISSIONER. SO I WANTED TO NOTE THAT AS

WELL.

THANK YOU.

MADAM CLERK, IF YOU COULD ADD COUNCILLOR EDWARDS, COUNCILLOR ESSAIBI-GEORGE, YOU HAVE THE FLOOR.

I WANT TO SAY THAT I THINK THAT THIS ORDER, ALTHOUGH WE HAVE TO TALK ABOUT THE RESIDENT STICKERS IN OUR CITY, THE AMOUNT OF RESIDENT STICKERS THAT ARE OUT AND ABOUT IN OUR NEIGHBORHOODS, WE'RE THINKING ABOUT PARKING AND TRANSPORTATION IN A MORE STRATEGIC WAY IN THE CITY. ON THE FACE OF THIS, THIS ORDER APPEARS TO BE PUNISHING TO SOME OF OUR OUTLYING NEIGHBORHOODS THAT DON'T HAVE ACCESS TO TRANSPORTATION TO GET INTO OUR CITIES SO EASILY.

IT SEEMS TO BE DIFFICULT FOR MANY OF OUR FAMILIES WHO NEED TRANSPORTATION TO GET THEIR KIDS EITHER TO AND FROM SCHOOL OR TO AND FROM THE HOCKEY RINK OR TO AND FROM THE BALL FIELD OR TO AND FROM AFTER SCHOOL OR WEEKEND ACTIVITIES.

WE HAVE MECHANISMS IN PLACE RIGHT NOW WHERE WE ARE CURRENTLY PASSING THROUGH EXCISE TAX,

CERTAINLY THROUGH PARKING
TICKETS, THE CURRENT RESIDENTS
IN THE CITY OF BOSTON.
WHAT WE HAVE MISSED IN SOME OF
THESE CONVERSATIONS ARE THOSE
THAT ARE FROM OUTSIDE OF THE
CITY OF BOSTON, OUTSIDE OF THE
COMMONWEALTH OF BOSTON, WHO ARE
ABUSING AND USING OUR STREETS
WITHOUT GIVING ANY RESOURCES,
WITHOUT PAYING IN WITH INSURANCE
TAX, WITHOUT PAYING IN ON EXCISE
TAX.

A LOT OF OUR RIDE SHARE COMPANIES COME FROM OUT OF STATE, NEVER MIND OUT OF CITY, USING OUR ROADS, CIRCLING OUR STREETS, CREATING A GREAT DEAL OF CONGESTION ON OUR STREETS. WE NEED TO MAKE SURE THAT WE'RE ENFORCING THE RULES THAT WE HAVE ON OUR BOOKS RIGHT NOW, LOOKING AT THEM IN A STRATEGIC WAY, IF THEY DO NEED TO BE CHANGED. I'M REALLY EXCITED MORE TO LEARN ABOUT THE PARKING CAP IN EAST BOSTON AND HOW WE COULD MAYBE DUPLICATE THAT AND EXPAND THAT THROUGHOUT THE CITY OF BOSTON AND MAKING SURE THAT TRANSPORTATION IS AVAILABLE FOR ALL BOSTONIANS IN A MEANINGFUL WAY.

BEFORE WE START TO PURPOSE THOSE THAT HAVE CARDS.

NOW, IS THERE ROOM FOR CHARGING FOR THE PARKING PASSES SO WE HAVE A BETTER IDEA OF WHO HAS WHAT AND WHERE IN THE CITY OF BOSTON?

WHEN A NUMBER OF STUDENTS RECEIVING SPECIAL ED SERVICES IS IN THE TENS OF THOUSANDS, WE KNOW WE NEED ADDITIONAL SERVICES TO SUPPORT OUR STUDENTS. WHAT WE HAVE IS NOT ENOUGH. WHAT WE DO IS NOT ENOUGH. WHEN I THINK ABOUT THE THOUSANDS OF STUDENTS, THE TENS OF THOUSANDS OF STUDENTS IN OUR DISTRICT WHO HAVE EXPERIENCED TRAUMA, WHO DO NOT HAVE ACCESS TO FULL-TIME NURSES, WHO DO NOT HAVE ACCESS TO BEHAVIORAL HEALTH AND MENTAL HEALTH IN THEIR SCHOOLS. WE KNOW WE DO NOT HAVE ENOUGH IN THE CITY OF BOSTON, AND THESE CHALLENGES REPLICATE THEMSELVES ACROSS THE COMMONWEALTH IN SO MANY OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICTS IN THIS GREAT STATE.

BUT IN BOSTON, OUR

RESPONSIBILITY IS TO STANDING UP FOR AND MAKING SURE WE HAVE NOT JUST APPROPRIATE FUNDING BUT THE FUNDING OUR KIDS NEED AND DESERVE TO GET THE SERVICES THAT THEY NEED.

WE CERTAINLY DO OUR PART HERE ON THE BOSTON CITY COUNCIL, MAKING SURE THAT THE BUDGET REFLECTS THOSE THINGS, THAT WE'RE PUTTING PRESSURE NOT JUST ON EACH OTHER THROUGH THIS WORK BUT ON OUR BOSTON SCHOOL COMMITTEE, ON OUR MAYOR, TO MAKE SURE THAT THE SCHOOLS ARE GETTING THE RESOURCES THEY NEED TO DO THE WORK.

THE GROWING VOLUME OF USED

SHARPS MAKES A NEED FOR SAFE

NEEDLE DISPOSALLICS, ESPECIALLY

WHEN WE THINK OF CHILDREN BEING PRICKED AT THE PLAYGROUND AND

THE NEED NOT TO DISPOSE OF NEEDLE ALSO IN HOUSEHOLD TRASH. IT'S IMPORTANT TO NOTE THAT ALTHOUGH WE HAVE TEN PERMANENT LOCATION THAT OFFER SAFE NEEDLE DISPOSAL ACROSS THE CITY, BOSTON LACKS SUFFICIENT COLLECTION SITES TO MEET THE VOLUME OF NEED FOR OUR SHARPS.

TO PREVENT INPROMMER DISPOSAL IN PUBLIC BUT ALSO TO PREVENT IMPROPERLY DISPROPOSAL IN OUR HOUSEHOLD TRACKS WE NEED TO GROW THIS NUMBER.

TOMORROW IN THE CITY WIDE NEEDLE TAKEBACK DAY, I AM GRATEFUL TO PARTNER WITH THE MASS COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTERS AND TO SHARE WITH YOU THAT ACROSS OUR CITY WE HAVE ALMOST 20 ADDITIONAL LOCATIONS, AND THOSE ARE ALL IN OUR COMMUNITY-BASED HEALTH CENTERS, THAT WILL BE COLLECTING NEEDLES FROM THE HOURS OF 10:00 A.M. TO 5:00 A.M.

ON EACH OF YOUR DESKS, BROKEN BY DISTRICTS, LOCATIONS THAT WILL BE COLLECTING, SO I HOPE YOU WILL GO IN, TAKE A PICTURE, IT'S A GREAT PHOTO OP BUT ALSO A GREAT OPPORTUNITY, THANKS TO SOME OF THE VOLUNTEERS AND THE EMPLOYEES AT THE COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTERS THAT ARE HELPING. WE HAVE VOLUNTEERS FROM THE USEFUL PUBLIC HEALTH ACTIVIST LAB.

WE ALSO HAVE BEEN SUPPORTED IN THIS EFFORT BY THE MAYOR'S OFFICE OF RECOVERY SERVICES AS WELL AS THE BOSTON PUBLIC HEALTH COMMISSION, THE CENTER OR ADDICTION, THE BOSTON MEDICAL CENTER WHICH ALL OF US MET THROUGH COUNCILLOR BAKER, HAVE BEEN A HUGE PARTNER IN THIS INITIATIVE AS WELL AS GILLETTE AND THOSE WHO HAVE FUNDED THE TOOLS THAT WE NEEDED FOR TOMORROW.
